The Ingredients of Prayer

Read: Ephesians 1:15-23; 3:14-21

God, I've been going to Church for the past two months faithfully. Now, when are you going to answer my prayers?

Lord, I know we will make a great couple. He so fine and you told me you will give me the desires of my heart!

God, if you get me out of this mess I promise you I will be committed in my faith.

Please, God, don't let her be pregnant. If she's not pregnant I won't have sex with her anymore.

God, hook me up. I thought I was your boy. Everybody is rolling hard and I shouldn't be on the bus.

God, how can you be blessing her like that when she has not been as faithful as I am. That just doesn't seem fair.

Lord, please let my mom live. I won't ask you for anything else but please let my mom live.

God, help me to not give in to my flesh today. I want to represent you today in all that I do. Fill me with your Spirit so that I can obey you today and be a blessing to others.



Aren't you glad that God doesn't meet our needs on the basis of how well we communicate them in prayer? Have you ever prayed in general terms for a need when you should have prayed specifically? Of course, all of us pray improperly from time to time. Many of us are guilty of needless repetition in our prayers. Most of us have prayed selfishly for things we would like, too. But even when we don't pray the way we should, God knows our specific needs and what's best for us.

THE INGREDIENTS OF PRAYER

A good way to keep from being selfish in our praying is to focus our prayers on others. God delights in our spirit of love and concern for others. In this final lesson for 1st Year CWOD, we will look at the Apostle Paul's prayers.

In Acts 20:17-38 Paul illustrated his love and concern for the people in the port town of Miletus. While saying goodbye to several Ephesian friends, Paul prayed and encouraged them to live godly lives for the Lord.

Paul's prayers contain important ingredients of praying according to God's will. Although some of his prayer requests may be different than ours, Paul realized the value of praying for his daily physical and spiritual needs. He also knew how to pray for specific needs. Carefully read Paul's two prayers. Then study his specific requests (listed below), and you'll begin to understand how your prayer requests can be similar to his.

Paul's First Prayer	Ephesians 1:15-23
Paul prayed other Christians would have:	You can pray your Christian friends will have:
1. The spirit of wisdom and revelation in the knowledge of God (v.17)	1. Understanding of what God is like and what He has done for them.
2. The hope of His calling (v.18)	2. Assurance of salvation and of spending eternity with Christ.
3. The riches of the glory of God's inheritance in the saints (v.18)	3. Confidence that they're special to God and valuable to Him.
4. The exceeding greatness of God's power to those who believe (v.19)	4. The strength God gives to overcome temptation and serve Him.

Paul's Second Prayer	Ephesians 3:14-21
Paul also prayed:	You can pray that:
1. Christians should be strengthened with might by God's Spirit in them (v.16)	1. The Holy Spirit would strengthen us to glorify God in all we do.
2. Christ may dwell in your hearts by faith (v.17)	2. Christ would feel at home in our lives as we trust Him more and live for Him.
3. Christians might know the love of Christ, which passes all knowledge (v.18)	3. We may understand the depth of God's love toward us.
4. Christians might be filled with all the fullness of God (v.19)	4. We would experience the greatness of God and be more devoted to Him daily.

Paul knew just as well as we do that God doesn't give us everything we ask for in prayer. That's because many of our desires are selfish. (Remember the "Living Out this Lesson" in Lesson

11?) But God knows what's best for us and promises to meet those needs (Phil. 4:19). We need to learn, therefore, how to pray according to God's will. As we study and meditate on God's Word, His will becomes clearer. We are better able, then, to pray according to His will, and the Holy Spirit intercedes for us according to God's will (Romans 8:26-27).



Paul's prayers for strength to meet his daily physical and spiritual needs were effective because they were prayed according to God's <u>will</u> (A few lessons back we talked about the meaning of God's will), and Paul was able to pray in God's will because of his commitment to knowing God better.

You see, Paul desired to know Christ, and the power of His resurrection, and the fellowship of His sufferings... (Phil.3:10). The fact that he was willing to <u>sacrifice</u> anything to improve his relationship with Jesus Christ is reflected in his words: "I consider everything a loss compared to the surpassing greatness of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord, for whose sake I have lost all things."—Phil. 3:8

Don't get lost in the complexity of scriptures wording. The idea is that Paul said his life was only worth living if it is lived for Jesus – that's it, that's all!

How much are you committed to knowing God? Boyfriends, girlfriends, sports, video games, music, cars, TV, jobs, and other interests are not necessarily wrong in themselves. But we can be so attracted to these things that they become obstacles or idols, causing us to stumble in our relationship with God (some of you can say Amen!).

Listen, the summer is coming and school is about to end. Are you trying to know God better? Are you willing to sacrifice any of these or other interests if they interfere with your relationship with God? We're calling you out!

Identify those areas of your life that may keep you from knowing God wholeheartedly. **Determine** in your heart that you won't allow them to take God's place in your life (Daniel 1:8a). If they already have, **confess** them to God. He **will forgive** you and **bring you back** into fellowship with Himself (1 John 1:9).
