No Strings Attached

This lesson focuses on Galatians chapter 1:1-9. As you read and study this lesson ask God to speak to your heart clearly.

The other day, Keith went to sign up at the Boys and Girls Club to play football. There were a few papers he had to make our be get his parents to sign in order to play. When he get

he had to make sure he got his parents to sign in order to play. When he got home his mom read through them and realized that he needed to take a physical, pay \$50 for his equipment, buy the right shoes, and participate in a fundraiser for his team. Keith said, "Wait a minute! The flyer said to sign-up if you want to play football. I didn't expect all of this! Why so many strings attached, Mom?"

In many ways, Keith has a good picture of the Galatian Christians. Certain Judaizers (those who required others to live according to Jewish customs) had told them (the Galatian Christians) that salvation by grace was not good enough either. There were other "strings attached" to salvation like obeying the



enough either. There were other "strings attached" to salvation like obeying the Mosaic Law as well.

A Different Gospel Message

The Apostle Paul understood the serious nature of this problem when he wrote to his Galatian brothers: "I am astonished that you are so quickly deserting the one who called you by the grace of Christ and are turning to a different gospel – which is really no gospel at all" (Galatians 1:6).

This other gospel preached by the Judaizers was the false teaching that salvation was based on good works in addition to grace. **Now pay close attention to this next statement**, for you may need to study and/or have further conversations concerning this.

Many churches teach that nonbelievers must stop drinking, smoking, cursing, get baptized, etc., before Jesus Christ will find them acceptable for salvation. Not true!

Getting baptized, stopping drinking, cursing, smoking, are all <u>results of</u> salvation, but <u>not requirements for</u> salvation. God offers the gift of salvation to all who will accept it – **no strings attached.** Are you still with me?

Grace, more than what you say at the Table

Grace is God showing us favor and kindness even though we haven't earned or deserved it. It's like a teacher awarding failing students an A rather than an F (some of you might relate). The gospel of grace teaches that God can save anyone, no matter who he/she is or what they have done.

Accepting the **free gift** of salvation (though not cheap, it cost Christ His life) is the only requirement for the grace of God. But Paul says **grace is no more grace** when works or obedience to the law are added to the conditions of salvation (review Romans 11:6). In fact, Paul says those who teach such a gospel are cursed or eternally condemned (Galatians 1:8-9).

So what are you saying, is the Law (or the 10 Commandments) no longer useful?

God gave man the law so that every mouth may be silenced and the whole world held accountable to God (Romans 3:19). The purpose of the law was to show the need for a Savior. (Read Romans 7:7) But by adding the law to salvation, the Judaizers taught that man could be saved by keeping the law completely. Living a sinless life, however, is **impossible** because of our old sinful nature (though we are not slaves to sin). Isaiah 64:6 puts it this way "All of us have become like one who is unclean, and all our righteous acts are like filthy rags; we all shrivel up like a leaf, and like the wind our sins sweep us away." While living a sinless life is a desirable goal, we are acceptable to God through His grace alone, not through our good works.

The goal of every Christian should be reflected in God's commands: "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind, and Love your neighbor as yourself" (Matthew 22:37,39) These two commands, which sum up the whole law, are the keys for godly living – no strings attached.



Just as the Judaizers based salvation partially on works, many Christians today have based their walk with God on a similar basis. Let's define some key terms for the sake of clarity. **A biblical standard** is clearly commanded in Scripture. For example: no stealing, no premarital or extramarital sex (fornication), no gluttony (excessive eating). **A conviction** is an opinion based on Scripture, but without explicit support saying it is clearly a sin. For example: what music or TV programs are appropriate for Christians, how to wear your hair, if you should date, etc.

Although developing convictions is important, be sure to exercise caution. Personal **convictions** should never serve as thermometers of our walk with God. But those who keep **biblical standards** should not assume they are automatically walking with God either. For example, we should never look at our lives and say, "Well, I don't lie or steal or get drunk, so I must be all right with God." *There are non-Christians that don't do these things either.*

Do you look down on others who may have stricter or more liberal convictions than you? If so, confess your self-righteousness to God. Determine in your heart to respect their convictions, whether you agree with them or not.
