From Silent Grief to Sacred Healing:

A Teen's Summer Camp Journey

ears had not fallen from Quamay's eyes in two years ... not since the day his eldest sister's life was taken by gun violence on Chicago streets. But there on a hillside in the Ozarks, surrounded by the peace of summer camp, the dam finally broke.

At 18, Quamay arrived for his sixth and final year at camp carrying both a college acceptance letter and

the weight of unresolved grief. While previous summers had been about fun and friendship, this time was different. "I was on a mission," he said, "and I completed it."

Though he still enjoyed the familiar comforts of "the food, the people, the fun, and the nature," God had deeper plans for Quamay's healing.

His counselors helped him confront the guilt he'd

been harboring —
the endless replay
of questions
about why he
wasn't there

when his sister died, why she had to be alone.

During Cross Talk, something shifted. "That was the first time I had cried in two years," Quamay shared. "Just to let it all out — the grief, the depression — just to give it all to God!"

His counselor, Willie Chatman, observed how, "loss had taken him back, but camp helped him regain that ground." Free from grief's chains, Quamay could finally look toward his future at Northeastern Illinois University with renewed purpose.

"I am now the oldest of six, and I have to be a good big brother," he reflected. "Camp has taught me accountability. I want to do more than just take them to school or cook for them, I want to tell them something that resonates, that changes their life — and not just my siblings, my friends, too!"

Today, Quamay studies at Northeastern Illinois University, focused on his degree and is, in his words, "rolling for Jesus."



Like Father, Like Son:



A Faith Journey Begins with Jiu Jitsu

hen Jesse walked into East LA Jiu Jitsu, he was looking for martial arts training — but he found something more. His instructor, Ron Mukai, had a different priority: sharing Christ's love through what he calls "patient evangelism." Through Ron's quiet example, Jesse discovered faith and chose to follow Jesus, wanting to model this new path for his children.

His son, Devin, watched this transformation with curiosity. When Ron suggested Devin attend a Christian summer camp in Missouri, the teenager took a leap of faith, leaving the familiar streets of East LA for the unknown.

At camp, Devin found more than new friends and swimming adventures — he found Jesus. The daily activities and welcoming atmosphere led him to make his own decision to follow Christ, and upon returning home, he asked to be baptized.


"I've seen my son grow from a kid going into depression, withdrawing — not blossoming — to a young man following God," Jesse shares. Now Devin leads his friends in prayer before meals and activities, and his peers are taking notice. As his father puts it, they're saying, "I want some of that."

Rute Retta's journey exemplifies this transformative cycle. At age 10, she began attending Granny's House, where she first experienced "a real sense of the love of Christ." For five summers, she attended KAA as a camper, deeply touched by her counselors' dedication and care. "KAA brought the love of Christ to life by showing me what true joy looks like," Rute explains.

This past summer, Rute fulfilled her dream of serving as a KAA staff member, working both in food service and as a counselor. During one memorable evening devotional, she witnessed God's powerful movement as her campers experienced a profound moment of repentance and forgiveness. "The beautiful part was seeing the forgiveness fill their hearts and multiply," she shares.

Now studying psychology and sociology at Drury University, Rute reflects, "Even though a week at camp doesn't seem like a lot, so much can happen."

Scholarships Open Doors



to Life-Changing Camp Experience

hen First Chance U leaders Chris and Tamara dreamed of bringing kids from Charlotte, NC, and Portsmouth, VA, to KAA camp, the financial barriers seemed insurmountable. Then, a phone call changed everything: a donor wanted to specifically support these children attending camp.

"Our hearts burst with gratitude, knowing that people who do not even know our kids loved them enough to want to finance an opportunity for them to hear the gospel of Jesus Christ," shares Tamara, who herself experienced KAA's impact as both a camper and counselor.

Through this generous scholarship support, First Chance U brought 35 campers and Kaleos (teen participants) from Charlotte and Portsmouth to KAA in 2024. For many families, the 17-hour journey and camp fees would have been out of reach without financial assistance.

The results were transformative. Twelve young people had lifechanging encounters with Christ during their week at camp.

"God's Word has been forever embedded in my heart from those precious moments at camp," Tamara reflects. "It was heartwarming to witness our kids have a similar encounter with Christ, one that will undoubtedly change their lives forever."

The impact extends beyond the campers. Parents witnessed such positive changes in their children that 100% of the participants are already signed up to return next year. Word of mouth is spreading through Charlotte and Portsmouth communities about the transformative camp experience.

"As much as the kids were being refreshed, so were we," Tamara notes. "It was a beautiful time of renewal for all of us."

This ripple effect of changed lives began with one donor's decision to provide scholarships. Through their generosity, 35 young people who might never have experienced KAA had the opportunity to encounter Christ in a powerful way, creating memories and spiritual foundations that will last a lifetime.

Children of Incarcerated Parents Find Freedom and Hope at Camp!

onths after they came home from camp ... the thought of their KAA experience still brought smiles to their faces and twinkles to their eyes.

Sisters Londyn (age 10) and Lauryn (age 12) got to experience something they are still talking about — KAA. The girls came to camp in June with a group from Oklahoma. This group is special because every child who came is an Angel Tree camper (a child of an incarcerated parent).

Camp made quite the impression on both girls. They were still excited to share all about it with KAA Admin Team members last fall when they met with the team in their





and they clapped and became animated when describing all the fun they had at camp.

"I get happy when I think about camp," Londyn shared. "I think about my camp friends every day." And it is no wonder why. Londyn recounted in detail how she loved meeting her counselors, getting to color, sharing with her cabin mates, joining in a cabin pillow fight, making new friends, tubing for the first time, jumping off the high dive, and most importantly, learning about Jesus.

As soon as she got home, Lauryn ran into her mom's room and performed all the cheers for her. She told her that camp made her overcome all her fears. Her older sister, Londyn, had an equally rewarding time at KAA. She signed up for the cheer class and said the highlight of camp was performing dance and cheer (especially *P31*, a cheer about being a Proverbs 31 woman) for the other campers.

"At camp, I learned to be honest and talk to God," Lauryn shared. "When I got there, I started to think about praying to Him and trusting Him."

Londyn and Lauryn's mom could not believe the impact camp is still having on her daughters. It is vital to her that her kids get to have fun but also build a life-long relationship with Jesus. "Kids will grow closer to Jesus at KAA. It builds character. Londyn and Lauryn's character has been amazing after camp," their mom, Krystal, reported. "I see new maturity and leadership — standing up for what is right. I am so grateful!"

Both girls cannot wait to return to camp this summer. Lauryn entered middle school last fall and has her cabin picture taped on her locker door next to a picture of her family. Londyn is recruiting friends to bring to camp with her. "I tell them, 'KAA will love to have you, and you will learn about God."





Personality Profile:

Dee Miller, KAA Board Member

ee Miller has been bringing kids to camp for more than 20 years ... impacting the lives of 836 campers and counting. Her life is a testament to her mission: ensuring that everyone she encounters knows Jesus. From prison ministry to children's ministry, Dee's heart for service is evident in all she does.

In 2000, Dee's son, Chris, called her from his college dorm, excited about a camp he'd discovered. He called it, "a camp like Kanakuk for black kids." Chris and his brother had attended Kanakuk for four years, so he was thrilled when Kids Across America (KAA) came to his campus recruiting summer staff.

That summer, Dee brought her first group of six campers from her church. The following year, the number grew to 30, and since then, she has brought 50 to 110 campers annually. Her daughter, Crystal, attended as a camper that first year and, except for one summer, has returned every year. Today, both Chris and Crystal join Dee as Kaleos, mentoring young campers.

For Dee, one of the greatest joys of serving as a Kaleo is "watching the kids be excited about Christ in a way that does not exist at home."

She cherishes the opportunity to bring high school-aged campers, calling it, "their last opportunity to be a kid." Many of her campers have had lifechanging firsts at KAA — their first time out of state, eating at a large restaurant, or simply





experiencing Christ in a meaningful way. "The little things we provide are a huge blessing to them," she says.

Dee's commitment extends beyond camp. She holds a Master's degree in criminology from Oklahoma State University, a Bachelor of Science in corrections/ criminal justice from Langston University, and a Bachelor of Education in secondary physical education from Oklahoma State University.

She served more than 30 years with the Oklahoma Department of Corrections, retiring in 2019 as a community sentencing administrator. However, retirement hasn't slowed her down. She now serves as the director of diversion and rehabilitative services for the Ninth District Attorney's Office and as program director for The About Face Women's Program, which helps reduce recidivism through long-term residential treatment and support for women.

Dee also ministers to families affected by incarceration, regardless

of age. Last year, through Light House Academy, a school serving children of incarcerated parents, she organized a group of Angel Tree campers and brought 45 children who desperately needed the experience of camp.

"KAA is a blessing for any person that spends a week on God's Mountain," Dee explains. "It's a place where kids experience Christ in a fun and meaningful environment."





Understanding trauma in summer camp ministry

t KAA, we recognize that every child who walks through our gates carries their own unique story. While some of our campers come from challenging home environments or face difficult circumstances, we see each arrival as a sacred opportunity to minister Christ's grace, love, and mercy. This mission drives everything we do, especially our comprehensive approach to staff training and preparation.

Before the summer season begins, KAA implements a thorough training program that equips our staff to create a safe, nurturing environment for every camper. Beyond essential sports and water safety instruction, all staff members complete our rigorous Child Protection Plan training, which prepares them to prevent, detect, and respond to any form of abuse in our youth programming. In 2024, we enhanced our preparation by adding trauma-informed training. deepening our ability to serve with understanding and compassion.

Trauma, as defined by the American Psychological Association, is an emotional response to devastating events such as accidents, abuse, neglect, violence, or loss of a loved one. These experiences are measured through Adverse Childhood Experience (ACE) scores, which help identify youth who may face increased academic, behavioral, and social challenges. By understanding these dynamics, our staff can better serve campers who carry such burdens.

This trauma-informed approach has already made a meaningful difference in how we minister to our campers. Dee, a recent Jackson State University graduate who served on our counseling team this summer, witnessed its impact firsthand.

"Trauma training helped me to walk with campers in explaining their pain experience by not capitalizing too much on the offense but on how they felt in that exact moment," she shared. "I saw that it helped campers talk through it a little easier when they didn't have to spill so much at one time."

Through this comprehensive trauma preparation training, KAA staff and volunteers are equipped to be faithful representatives of Jesus' love, meeting each child exactly where they are with grace, understanding, and hope.
